He is considered, with Camillo Cavour, Victor Emmanuel II and Giuseppe Mazzini, as one of Italy's "fathers of the fatherland". Garibaldi was a central figure in the Italian Risorgimento, since he personally commanded and fought in many military campaigns that led eventually to the formation of a unified Italy. He generally tried to act on behalf of a legitimate power, which does not make him exactly a revolutionary: for example, he was appointed general by the provisional government of Milan in 1848, General of the Roman Republic in 1849 by the Minister of War, and led the Expedition of the Thousand on behalf and with the consent of Victor Emmanuel II."-- Wikipedia.

yearnings for his native land, it was perhaps better for him and for Italy that he should have been spared the protracted apprenticeship to conspiracy and intrigue undergone by Mazzini and his friends. Our hero had not the soul of a conspirator. He could not have hung on the skirts of inaction, satisfied with a perpetual cycle of plots and projects, half-hearted insurrections and precipitate retreats. If Garibaldi had never gone to South America never left the company of his restless and injudicious fellow countrymen, he would in all probability have thrown himself, even single-handed, upon the swords of the Neapolitan or Austrian tyrants, and died on the battle field or in prison, leaving his name undistinguished and his task unfulfilled. It was indeed to his participation in the earlier attempts of Mazzini's disciples that Garibaldi owed his exile; but throughout his long absence from Italy he never forgot that his country was being crushed under the heel of an oppression scarcely credible in the present day; and he never ceased to cherish the hope that a time would come when he could return to the well-beloved land, and place himself at the head of her

This book looks closely at the life, military experiences and key battlefield exploits of Giuseppe Garibaldi. Born on 4 July 1807 in the city of Nice, the turning point in his life

occurred in April 1833 when he met Giovanni Battista Cuneo, a member of the secret movement known as 'Young Italy'. Joining this society, Garibaldi took an oath dedicating his life to the struggle for the liberation of his homeland from Austrian dominance. The subsequent years would see him fighting in Brazil, in the Uruguayan Civil War, and on the Italian peninsula. Between 1848 and 1870, Garibaldi and his men were involved in a prolonged struggle that eventually led to the final unification of Italy in 1870.

Included in this book are samples of John Garibaldi's wartime correspondence to his wife, lists of Italian Americans who served as officers and noncommissioned sailors in the Union Navy, and first-hand correspondence of William Howell Reed (Virginia hospitals overseer under President Grant) and the brother of a young Italian who died in the hospital during the war. Sons of Garibaldi in Blue and Gray fills a critical gap in studies of Italian American life in the United States in the late 1800s.

In 1875, a few years after Italian unification, General Garibaldi, the legendary military hero of the Risorgimento, left his island retreat in the Mediterranean for Rome. His battle cry no longer required, he was pursuing a mission that would become an obsession in his old age- to divert the River Tiber from Rome.

Garibaldi had his own reasons to fight the scourge of malaria and reclaim the health of central Italy. His desperate endeavour reflected his wish to repair the past. Behind his florid promise to revitalise 'Italy' and convert the Tiber's course into a Parisian-style boulevard that would be a wonder of the modern world, lay a traumatic event felt by Garibaldi as

the defining tragedy of his life- the loss of his wife. Despite himself, he became embroiled in the political labyrinth of Rome, trials and tribulations worthy of Kafka. This story of thwarted ambition, grand illusion and delusion, was not lost on Garibaldi's later admirer, Benito Mussolini, another self-styled redeemer of Rome and the fever-ridden marshes of Italy.
