G.O.D. specifically focuses on the year of 1986 because of the Reagan era's "Just Say No" campaigns, which the book suggests were a cute facade to the tsunamis of destruction brought by the CIA and the CIA-backed armies in South America. Through the CIA, the American government used a Californian drug ring to systematically cripple Americans in ghettos nationwide.
